





THERE AND BACK AGAIN

I've been to Salt Lake City many times over the years, mostly on ski trips, but Louise hadn't and neither had Susan, Bruce Portz's wife. So Bruce, who had been there often on "bidness", and I determined that we go back again this summer for the MOA Rally



and show the girls the sights getting there, in the city and back again to the Portz Resort and Spa on the side of a mountain in Golden, CO. Bruce and Susan are non-resident members of BMWDFW. Louise and I drug them into our organization after meeting them over 15 years ago on a Ride through Tuscany. We've been riding together in Europe and the US ever since.

Before the trip began Bruce and Susan took us sight seeing in their neck of the woods; places like the **New Terrain Brewing Co** on Table Mountain Pkwy, complete with craft beer, a food truck and a terri-



fic view; **Buffalo Bill's Museum and grave** situated on Look Out Mountain towering over the Coors Brewery and nearby downtown Golden. The Turkey sandwiches and Duffy's Rowdy Root Beer Floats at the **Pahaska Tepee** carried us til dinner at **240** Union Restaurant in Lakewood CO, where they offered "healthy" options. The **Unsinkable Molly Brown's home** in Denver near the capital has been renovated but no a/c. It was a marvel of architecture and build quality for its time. A short distance away we rubbed shoulders with the state politicos at their favorite spot for power lunches....Racine's.

On Saturday, July 8, we packed

our bikes for the forthcoming Sunday departure, took the requisite naps and lolled outside on the various patios being thankful our lives are so blessed. Sunday morning, July 9, found us blasting off about 10 AM enjoying light traffic along CO 6, I-70 and US 40, up and over Berthoud Pass, dropping down into Winter Park, one of my favorite ski areas, before catching a quick lunch in Granby. US 40 is a sweet road for a US highway so we stayed on it over Rabbit Ears Pass and came down in Steamboat Springs at 2:30 PM. We "holed up" at the Rabbit Ears **Motel**. That evening we promenaded along the Yampa River lined with bars and restaurants, slipping in to the **Chop House** in time for Happy Hour and **Table 79** for dinner.





Monday morning we departed at 9:30 AM (a civilized hour) on an indirect route to **Flaming Gorge, UT**. A stint on CO 13 out of Craig down to Meeker was in order, then CO 64 to Rangely for lunch at our favorite Coffee House from previous Off-Road excursions in this area. Thunder storms were raising up their anvil shaped tops all around so we bolted for Vernal, UT, passing within view of Dinosaur National Monument, then into Ashley National Forest, mounting the twisting staircase of US 191 and arriving at Dutch John and the **Flaming Gorge Resort** (our home for two nights) just behind a departing, ugly, highly-charged storm we'd been watching on our radar apps.

On past adventures up here, both On-Road and Off, we have stayed at Red Canyon Lodge nearby but we were put on a perpetual "wait list." As a less pastoral alternative, I recommend Flaming Gorge Resort

and their restaurant. We've eaten there many times over the years on rides through this area, but I never appreciated the food as much before, especially the trout, poblano soup and the

> giant Turtle Brownie Sundae! The vintage motel sits on a hill above the restaurant and fishing operation (including a service station). The rooms all have private decks furnished with chairs and tables... perfect for long talks with Bruce and Susan, watching the deer and the gamboling

thunderstorms in the late afternoon and settling in before bedtime. Flaming Gorge and the Green **River** flowing through it is a fly-fishing paradise and I plan to come back for it at another time. On Tuesday, we got pinned down at the Visitor Center adjacent to the dam by a long string of very wet thunder-storms. When we saw a gap, we headed back to the Resort for a heavenly afternoon of reading and napping to the tune of raindrops and rolling thunder.... And Cool....

Wednesday was our day to trundle into Salt Lake City. With a short distance to travel we managed a leisurely departure at 10:30, riding northwesterly up UT 44 and WY 43 to hold onto the cool air and maximize the view as long as possible. As a last gasp, before acquiescing to the mundane on Interstate 80, we stopped for water at **Fort Bridger State Historic Site**, hot as hell even at 6600 feet. It was originally a 19th century fur trading outpost established in 1842, on Blacks Fork of the Green River. It became a resupply point for wagon trains on the Oregon, California and Mormon Trails.

We arrived at the Little America Hotel in downtown Salt Lake City around 2pm and met in the ice-cold bar at 3 where we had an early supper, later in the afternoon. Great Hotel. Spa, indoor and outdoor pools, workout room, underground parking for our bikes and an air-conditioned train to the rally site passing by every 15 minutes.

All about sightseeing, we walked from the hotel to the **Da Vinci Mu-**

seum across from the gothic **city** hall. The main focus was "flight" which drew me like a moth to flame. After a couple hours we strolled over to the Public Li**brary**, a library like no other I have seen. It is in juxtaposition with ancient Roman aqueducts and a multi-level modern mall under an atrium. Incredible light!

A late lunch called and we found Max-

well's, a craft beer haven that also produced super pizzas. We

walked it all off, reaching our hotel in time to meet our tour opera-

tor and struck off on a City Tour which included the Capitol building, second only to Texas' in size, University of Utah campus, The **Place** where Brigham Young designated what is now Salt Lake City

as the "Promised Land" of the Mormons, the World Headquarters of the Mormon Church and Temple



Square. Dinner was in the **Red Lion**, Brigham Young's home where he housed a bunch of wives and over 26 children. For a time he was the "power" in Utah. After dinner we were treated to a



two hour rehearsal of the Mormon Tabernacle

Choir in their new 23,000 seat performance hall. Imagine 360 choir members and a 100 piece orchestra. Nothing in DFW can match it.

On Friday we rode the air conditioned train to the Rally site and hung around for the group picture then took the girls home for lunch on the patio. Bruce and I returned to the rally, shopped, attended Fred Rau's seminar on New Zealand then watched the GS Giant competition with Rod, Ronnie, Joel and Andy. That wore me out.

Saturday lunch found us attending an organ performance in the **Tabernacle** (former venue for the Mormon Tabernacle Choir) famous for its wonderful acoustics and larger organ than the performance hall. Bruce and I went back to the rally after lunch thinking we might win something. A train break-down on the way back to the hotel prompted us to start walking and making periodic rest stops at beckoning bars along the way. We discovered the Market Street Grill that way and brought the girls back for dinner that evening....great seafood.

Sunday was a travel day to **Moab**. We pulled in to the **Best Western** – **Greenwell** in time for a late lunch/early supper at Zak's just across the street, then a slow walk along the main drag checking out the shops. I had never seen Arches National Park where daytime tem-

peratures were predicted to exceed 100 degrees, so we rose fairly early Monday morning and rolled into the Park near 8:00 AM around. At about 11o'clock we tore ourselves away from the incredible sights like Court House Towers, Delicate Arch, Sandstone Arch and the Fiery Furnace and headed for the airconditioned Visitors' Center. That evening we engaged Moab Adven-

ture Tours for a Sunset Safari over on Slick Rock Trail, a landscape of steep petrified sand dunes and eroded remnants of

> ancient sea beds. Of course we did it in modified Hummers rather than mountain bikes, Crazy! The girls almost balked at signing the waivers of liability, but I think they enjoyed the ad-

venture when it was over...a little bit.

Tuesday began with a lovely 25 mile ride on **UT128** along the Colorado

River, the natural south boundary of UT 128



So, we soldiered on down to Aspen, dodging snow piles and dislodged rocks. The precip ended just before we entered Aspen city limits.

Our rooms were not ready when we arrived at the **Hearthstone House**, so while I got out of my wet suit in the spa, the manager set us up in the lounge with wine and hors d'oeuvres, on the house. The thunder storms found us while we were having Cocktails in the **Jerome Ho**tel and hounded us as we walked to **Meat & Cheese** for dinner.

Thunderstorms were predicted to increase along our planned route for



the rest of the week so, we headed for the Portz hacienda, pausing long enough to sit on the patio at the **New Terrain** in Golden, watching the thunderstorms build and threaten, drinking craft beer and snacking on empanadas from the food truck. There and Back again.
