

Easy Olympic Riders

From an article forwarded to the editor about our own Johnny Kresena

Three Tarrant County motorcyclists will roll through the Olympics on BMWs, but they have to remain in the background, providing rides for photographers and other services.

A leviathan with a 1,000 cubic-centimeter BMW engine prowls among the bicycles in the pack.

Accompanied by the chicka-chicka clicks of a photographer's camera, **Johnny Kresena** of Fort Worth guides his monster of a motorcycle, humming quietly through the hiss of spinning spokes.

Kresena's passenger photographs a grimacing cyclist, then the motorcycle man slithers away and the pack closes behind them.

Gosh, you gotta love German engineering.

"We're usually going 30 or 40 miles an hour, handlebar to handlebar with these bicyclists, and they'll either let you through, or they're throwing water bottles at you," Kresena explained.

Kresena and fellow motorcylists Dean Kauffman of Fort Worth and Bob Murphy of Grapevine expect to relive that scene hundreds of times as they ferry photojournalists into the cycling road races and the marathons during the Atlanta Olympic Games, which start Friday.

The three riders are old hands at the business, having worked the Tour DuPont since 1990, the 1992 Olympic cycling trials and the Hotter 'n Hell 100 in Wichita Falls. Combined, they have more than 100 years of motorcycling experience. It's thee best seat in the house, said Kauffman, 62. "You'd be amazed at those athletes. Those bicycles are so light, and they handle the corners so well, that it's hard to even catch them on a motorcycle."

The three were selected based on their motorcycling experience and past performances, said Sheryl Ratzell, the chief financial officer for ALEM Competition Services. ALEM is an Atlanta-based firm that organizes BMW-sponsored sporting events.

"I've ridden with them, and they're the best in the United States," said Casey Gordon, a Denver-based freelance photographer who covers cycling events. "We don't hold on when we're riding because our hands are on our cameras, and we've been doing 60 miles an hour on a downhill where! our foot pegs scrape the road, and they are so smooth. It mak! es it a lot easier for me."

They are among 30 motorcycle drivers working the Olympics. Besides ferrying photographers, they will serve as course marshals and couriers, provide medical help and technical support for the bicycles.

Kresena got involved in motorcycle support for races through the Tour of Texas in 1978.

After learning to command his motorcycle in tight, extreme situations, Kresena moved into bigger races such as the Tour DuPont. He enlisted the support of fellow motorcycle enthusiasts Kauffman, a retiree from TU Electric, and Murphy, a retired pilot.

The motorcycles have suspensions designed to handle jaunts off the roads, through gravel patches or into corn fields, depending on what happens in the pack. Kresena said they usually have only the width of the white line on the side of the road in which to ride their motorcycles.

Before the Olympics, the riders will enroll in another two-day slow-driving clinic conducted by motorcycle police instructors. Whether barreling down the side of a mountain or inching up a steep hill while surrounded by 200 cyclists, handling the motorcycle becomes a life-or-death issue.

"The type of riding we do, we'll be going down the road, and our saddlebags will be touching," Kauffman explained. "If we're doing a twisty going down a hill at 70 miles an hour, my front tire will almost touch theirs, and I have no problem with that because my life is in their hands, and theirs is in mine."

The cycling race will go on, even if fog limits visibility to mere feet or rain makes the streets a two-lane banana peel. At day's end, the motorcyclists gather at the finish line and wait to verify that each rider returns safely.

"The safety of the bicyclist is No. 1, and then comes the safety of our own," Murphy said.

The motorcyclists are just as professional when it comes to the race.

Kauffman said they do not keep up with the race standings or have any favorite riders so that he remains as removed as possible from the action.

They don't allow cyclists to follow too closely behind in order to prevent giving the cyclists an aerodynamic advantage.

And they manage to make hulking, growling machines invisible in a sea of slender bicycles.

"If we get in the pictures or on TV, we get in trouble," Kresena said. "We know that it's a bicycle race and not a motorcycle race, so they don't want you in the picture.

"There are serious mountains. You'll go 3 mph uphill, and then you're hitting 70 miles-an-hour going back down the other side, and you're trying to keep ahead of them."

But they still manage to have fun.

Kauffman said he once ferried Tour de France winner Greg LeMond through a race in Minneapolis to give the famed American cyclist "a chance to see how a bicycle race really looks."

Murphy laughs while recalling the speeding tickets and threatened arrests they've received from police officers who didn't believe the motorcycles blowing by at 100 mph were truly involved with the race.

And Kresena simply smiles when he thinks about getting paid to do something he loves.

"We get to see the United States on a motorcycle and we get to meet some of the nicest people in the world," Kresena said. "Now we get to do the Olympics. Who wouldn't love it?"

Garmin Smart Link App

Available for Select Garmin "Navigator" & "Zumo" devices.

(To be used with Apple IOS and Android Smartphones)

Introduction

This Article is informational and not intended for training or Application setup. Alerting possibilities are easily configured & most display automatically when your Navigator/Zumo is active with a paired Smartphone.

Garmin Smart Link is a free App

The Application connects your Smartphone to your Garmin Navigator/Zumo and displays several possible information overlays DIRECTLY ONTO your Garmin GPS Display.



The possible items presented on your GPS Display are as follows;

- <u>1-Live Traffic alerts</u> for re-routes, congestion, accidents road closures and so forth. This information is gathered from a variety of sources by your Smartphone and utilized within the Garmin map software to present alerts based upon your direction of travel. It alerts you regardless of whether you are on a predetermined "Route" or merely riding on roadways casually.
- <u>2-Live Traffic Cameras</u> for live visibility to road conditions and traffic in addition to Live Traffic Alerts that you may get. This feature is not available in Texas by law, but is available in most other states as you travel through them.

There is a ONE TIME LIFETIME FEE for this service of \$4.99.


<u>3 - Basic Weather Forecast Information</u> - this is a high level forecast for the location you are presently traveling through offering basic Weather conditions forecasts by day for a period of one week.



<u>4 - Live Advanced Weather Conditions Overlay & Alerts</u> - this feature over-lays current weather conditions for the area you are travelling onto the current Map display. It is color coded for different types of precipitation and conditions.

There is a ONE TIME LIFETIME FEE for this service of \$4.99.

I experienced a tremendous hollow feeling riding into the Rally this year and seeing my friend's vendor spot empty. Another of his friends, told me the situation. **I'm bummed**.

Before we add more names to the Lost Friends list, we need to appreciate the friends we have just a little bit more. We need hang out more. We need to visit more. Shoot the sh*t. Drink a beer. Maybe the Tourmeister needs so set up more social events on next year's ride calendar. Change the theme of the upcoming riding season from "Ride to Eat" to "Ride to Visit With Our Friends" Before Any More Fade Away and Leave Us With that Sad Hollow Feeling.
